Likewise, the author of the argument against the measure may prepare and submit a rebuttal argument to the argument in favor of the measure or may authorize in writing any other person or persons to prepare, submit, or sign the rebuttal argument.

A rebuttal argument shall not be accepted unless accompanied by this completed form, which shall contain the printed name(s) and signature(s) of the person(s) submitting it or, if submitted on behalf of a bona fide association of citizens/organization, the name of the association/organization and the printed name and signature of at least one of its principal officers.

Word count limit for Rebuttal Arguments = 250 The rebuttal arguments shall be submitted to the elections official conducting the election no later than 8-27-18 These rules apply to all rebuttal arguments unless a rebuttal argument is otherwise provided by law. With fewer than 7200 students in Jefferson Elementary School District, Measure I already borrowed over \$9400 for each student. Wasn't that enough for classrooms? What are they doing with all this money?
