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Which candidates advance to the General Election?	 For partisan offices only, the candidate from each party that received the highest number of votes at the Primary Election advanced to the General Election. For non-partisan offices, the candidate that receives a majority of the vote at the Primary Election wins. Non-partisan contests do not appear on the General Ballot unless there is need for a run-off election. 	 For party nominated offices, the one (1) candidate from each party that receive the highest number of votes at the Primary Election advance to the General Election For voter nominated offices, the two (2) candidates regardless of party preference that receive the highest number of votes advance to the General Election. For non-partisan offices, the candidate that receives a majority of the vote at the Primary Election wins. Non-partisan contests do not appear on the General Ballot unless there is need for a run-off election.
What information appears on the official ballot about each candidate?	Name Optional Ballot Designation – describing the candidates principal occupation, vocation or profession	 Name Optional Ballot Designation – describing the candidates principal occupation, vocation or profession Party Preference – voter-nominated offices ONLY, a candidate can choose to have their party preference as they are registered appear on the ballot. One of the following statements will appear with their name on the official ballot: "My party preference is the Party." When a candidate is registered with a political party and chooses to have it appear on the ballot the name of that party will fill in the blank space. If the candidate is registered with a party but does not want it to be printed on the ballot, the blank space will be left blank. "No Party Preference"
When can write-in candidates run?	Write-in candidates are eligible to run in any contest at any election.	 For party nominated offices write-in candidates are eligible to run at any election. For voter nominated offices, write-in candidates are eligible to run only at the Primary Election. Write-in candidates are not allowed at the General Election.
