| Which candidates advance to the General Election? | - For partisan offices only, the candidate from each party that received the highest number of votes at the Primary Election advanced to the General Election. <br> - For non-partisan offices, the candidate that receives a majority of the vote at the Primary Election wins. Non-partisan contests do not appear on the General Ballot unless there is need for a run-off election. | - For party nominated offices, the one (1) candidate from each party that receive the highest number of votes at the Primary Election advance to the General Election <br> - For voter nominated offices, the two (2) candidates regardless of party preference that receive the highest number of votes advance to the General Election. <br> - For non-partisan offices, the candidate that receives a majority of the vote at the Primary Election wins. Non-partisan contests do not appear on the General Ballot unless there is need for a run-off election. |
| What information appears on the official ballot about each candidate? | - Name <br> - Optional Ballot Designation - describing the candidates principal occupation, vocation or profession | - Name <br> - Optional Ballot Designation - describing the candidates principal occupation, vocation or profession <br> - Party Preference - voter-nominated offices ONLY, a candidate can choose to have their party preference as they are registered appear on the ballot.
