If both an argument in favor of and against a measure have been selected for publication in the voter information pamphlet, a rebuttal to the argument in favor of or the argument against the measure may be submitted as outlined in this form.

The author of the argument in favor of the measure may prepare and submit a rebuttal argument to the argument against the measure or may authorize in writing any other person or persons to prepare, submit, or sign the rebuttal argument. Likewise, the author of the argument against the measure may prepare and submit a rebuttal argument to the argument in favor of the measure or may authorize in writing any other person or persons to prepare, submit, or sign the rebuttal argument.

A rebuttal argument shall not be accepted unless accompanied by this completed form, which shall contain the printed name(s) and signature(s) of the person(s) submitting it or, if submitted on behalf of a bona fide association of citizens/organization, the name of the association/organization and the printed name and signature of at least one of its principal officers.

Word count limit for Rebuttal Arguments = 250

The rebuttal arguments shall be submitted to the elections official conducting the election no later than 8/24/15.

These rules apply to all rebuttal arguments unless a rebuttal argument is otherwise provided by law.

Rebuttal to the Argument in Favor of Measure X

In 2014, voters in the District overwhelming rejected a \$130,000,000 bond measure. 13

Yet, the School District Board clearly didn't get the message. Now, they're 12 back for that \$130,000,000 plus another \$18,000,000. >

What part of NO didn't the school board get? 10

They claim this bond measure is needed to provide 50 new classrooms for 13 enrollment that has increased from school year 2011-12 to 2013-14 (latest 13 figures available) by 501 students. >

That's only 10 students per classroom. Let's do the math: \$148,000,000 13 divided by 50 new classrooms equals \$2,960,000 per classroom. 10

Those sure must be very special classroom at \$2,960,000 each! 11

In 2010, just 5 years ago, voters in the district did pass a parcel tax to 16 "support smaller class sizes". 4

What happened to that money? Clearly, if they need 50 new classrooms, 12 that money didn't get spent on class size reduction. 10

Finally, school bonds, just like mortgages, have to be paid back, in full, plus 14 interest. These interest payments (tax money from you) don't go to eachers, 13 libraries, computers, or maintenance, etc.; they just go to service the debt. 12

Debt you have to pay for. Debt your children will have to pay for and debt 16 your grandchildren will have to pay for. Bonds can last up to 40 years!!! 14

If you oppose this huge debt burden, please vote NO on Measure X. 12

Make the School Board pay attention to you: no means no!!! 11

You can be for schools, for students, and against Measure X. 10
